Exams required for licensure include: - Vision Exam: A mechanical device tests vision, requiring at least 20/60 in one eye with or without corrective lenses and a field of vision of 140-degrees. Failure may require a Vision Report Form. - Knowledge Exam: This consists of two tests - the Road Rules Test and the Road Signs Test. Applicants must pass each test with a minimum score of 15 out of 20 correct answers. To drive without restrictions, they must hold their permit for a specified period and meet the DMV's eligibility standards. The state requires applicants to provide verification documents and pay licensing fees to obtain an instructional permit. There are restrictions on passengers while driving: - For the first six months, permit holders can only have immediate family members in the vehicle - After six months, permit holders can have one additional passenger under 21 years old Seatbelt usage is mandatory for all drivers. Traffic violations committed by GA learners license holders result in penalties based on infraction severity. In some cases, permit holders may be ineligible to apply for regular driving privileges after a longer period than usual. To drive with a permit alone in Georgia, individuals must hold restricted permits for 12 months and one day before obtaining a regular license. Unrestricted permit applicants must meet specific requirements, including: - Being at least 16 years old - Completing driver's education courses - Passing additional assessments - Paying fees The validity of instructional permits in Georgia is two years long. The cost of restricted licenses varies and includes processing costs. Residents should prepare for the licensing procedure by having sufficient funds available, as fees apply to transactions. New license applicants may face denial if unable to pay required fees at application time.
