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possum noises can be a real nuisance, especially when you're not sure if there's an actual animal up there or just some other sound. one possibility is that the noise is made by a possum, which can range from a bit of scratching to what sounds like a team of football players rampaging through the roof. possums are active at this time of year, especially young ones who have left their mum's pouch and are starting to explore, they might start off innocent but then get older and learn to fight as they move out of the home, sometimes, these little critters can end up in unwanted places like range hoods or chimneys, in general, possums dont live in trees, so why do we have them in our roofs? it's because humans built homes with large roof spaces that are easy for possums to access and chew through, so if you're looking for a gap of tennis ball size, gaining entry is usually pretty easy. sometimes, they even chew through lead flashing like the picture below shows.some people believe that possums will leave after a while, but it's unlikely, another idea is to put up a possum box in a nearby tree, which they might use instead of your roof, however, once you have a possum in your roof, the only way to keep them out is to make your house possum-proof, so, what can you do when you hear noises in the roof? first, try to determine what's making the noise. it's usually either a possum or some rodents. if it's a possum, then figure out how they got in and block the hole. sometimes, people have blocked holes with chicken wire but that just gets ripped out by the possum and rat noises for 12 years and offer a guarantee if the problem persists after our service. removing the possum is just part of the job; we aim to prevent future invasions.possums are known to make noise in your roof because it's a great place to sleep, but they can be quite messy as time goes on. they'll want to mark their territory by urinating and spreading their scent trail around, which makes insulation useless. the noise that bothers most people is heavy running like someone walking through the roof. if you're hearing scratching, thumping, or scampering above your ceiling at night, it's likely a possum in your roof. as cities expand, possums are increasingly seeking shelter in roof spaces. while their visits might seem noisy, remember that they're just curious animals. so, what do you do when faced with this problem? call us and let us handle the issue for you. After the opossum out of your roof, make sure to check the area for entrance points. An opossum is known to be a great climber, so it may have left through a window, or other opening, that should be easily closed and sealed with caulk around the frame. It is impotant to close all access points to the attic, which the wildlife may use to get inside. If an opossum is currently living in your roof, do not attempt to go up and get it out. They may bite and scratch and the risk of contracting a disease through their teeth or claws is high. The best way to avoid possums in your roof is to maintain your roof in good condition so that they cannot enter. The capture or otherwise harming of a possum from your roof. Firstly, find out where the possum is entering your roof. This will probably be under the eaves and perhaps close to a tree or bush that rests against the house and provides access. Once you have found the likely spot, you will need to monitor it just after dark to see if the possum exits. Once you are sure the possum is using this spot to gain entry to your roof, and he/she has left for the night, you need to seal the hole. This can be done with timber, or solid sheeting of some sort. Place it high enough from the ground so that the possum will be out of reach of domestic cats and dogs. Place some fruit (apple, pear, grapes), near the box or drey as a way of encouraging the possum to investigate its new home.
